

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Blossom of Cr ss-Generations From Binary Modern Chinese to Multidimensional Taiwanese Contemporary Art

Liang Gallery is pleased to feature 10 representative artists' works at Art Basel Hong Kong with the theme "Blossom of Cross-Generations- From Binary Modern Chinese to Multidimensional Taiwanese Contemporary Art" from March 21 to 25, 2023 (Private View VIPs will have access to the show on March 21 to 22) at Hong Kong Convention and Exhibition Centre.

In the early twentieth century, against the backdrop of war and colonialism, Western ideology influenced East Asia including China and Taiwan, culturally and educationally. The first wave was the clash and fusion of Eastern and Western systems in art. Those who reflected this wave of dramatic generational change, such as CHEN Cheng-Po, CHU Teh-Chun and SHIY De-Jinn, continued to innovate and incorporate Eastern thinking into the paintings of Western theories.

While global art trends were adjusting to the post-World War II context, Taiwan was a land of creative freedom. In addition to the fact that the predominance of ink painting was debated, the art also drew inspiration from the outside. A wide range of concepts from philosophy and sociology continues to impact the boundaries of creative media and art forms.

Exanimating a time from an artistic perspective, Taiwan has multiple historical lines. Contemporary art is never just a single centre but a multidimensional light source, shining fascinatingly at every meeting point.

At the same time, our featured artist Hsu Yunghsu will exhibit his representative work 2019-37 at booth EN13 in the Encounter Sector. Hsu uses his body as a medium to create a giant piece that requires skill and accurate kiln firing conditions, which brings a highly intense experience to the audience. In addition, video artists HSU Chia-Wei's works Electronic-mobility, Earthcraft, Is the Stone Coffin a Coffin? and Chang Ting-Tong's Soap have been selected by curator Li Zhenhua for screening in the Film Sector. These works will be shown at the Louis Koo Cinema, Hong Kong Arts Centre from March 23rd to 25th.

Liang Gallery is a leading private art gallery based in Taipei, Taiwan, dedicated to researching Taiwanese art history and promoting domestic and international exhibitions.

CHEN Cheng-po 陳澄波


1895-1947



Chen Cheng-po was born in Chiayi, Taiwan in 1895 and graduated from the Tokyo School of Fine Arts (now Tokyo University of the Arts) in 1927. He was admitted to the Tokyo School of Fine Arts in 1924. His oil painting *Outside Chiayi Street (1)* was selected for the "Imperial Art Exhibition of Japan" in 1926. Chen was the first Taiwanese painter to have obtained such an honor. In later years, his works continued to be selected for the "Imperial Art Exhibition of Japan" and the "Taiwan Fine Arts Exhibition." From 1929 to 1933, he lived in Shanghai teaching at various fine art schools and appraising works of art at art associations. He participated in "The 1st National Art Exhibition of the Republic of China," and attended the preparatory session of the Juelan Society.

In 1933, he returned and settled in Taiwan where he actively participated in founding the Red Island Painting Society and the Taiyang Art Society. During this period, Chen had freed himself from all restraints and expressed his inner passions without reserve in his works. He left a great number of masterpieces depicting his homeland. In 1945, the World War II came to an end, and Taiwan was returned to the Nationalist Government. He was actively involved in promoting art and planned to establish an art school. Chen Cheng-po was only 53 years old when the 228 Incident in 1947 claimed his life.

Throughout his life, Chen was involved in various modern art activities in Taiwan, Tokyo, and Shanghai. This fusion of diverse cultures has profoundly influenced his painting style, thus making him one of the most unique masters of Chinese art. His rich and splendid life reflects various changes in the art circle influenced by different political rules in Taiwan. At the same time, his life is also an epitome of the art modernization processes in East Asian art history. He contributed to actively promoting Taiwanese art and culture, thus becoming a highly influential painter in the history of Taiwanese art.



CHU Teh-Chun 朱德群

Chu Teh-chun was born in Jiangsu, China in 1920 and graduated from the Hangzhou School of Fine Arts in 1941, under the direction of Lin Fengmian. Chu Teh-chun taught at the Nanjng Central University from 1944 until 1949, when he left for Taipei to teach at the Art Department of the Taiwan National University, holding his first solo exhibition in 1954 at the Taipei Chung Shan Hall. Relocating to Paris in 1955, Chu Teh-chun began to explore Abstraction in his own art after seeing an exhibition of Nicolas de Stäel's abstract works. Chu Teh-chun has received a number of accolades including the Silver Award at the Paris Salon du Printemps in 1957, the l'Ordre des Palmes Académiques Paris in 2001, and the European Gold Medal of Merit in Luxembourg in 2006. In 1997, he was inducted into the prestigious L'Institute de France, as a member of the Beaux-Arts and ten years later named Officier de l'Ordre national du Mérite by the President of France.

SHIY De-Jinn 席德進

SHIY De-jinn was born in Sichuan, China in 1923 and graduated from the Hangzhou National Art College, Hangzhou, China in 1948. At the age of five, he began learning to draw. In 1948, he graduated from the Hangzhou National College of Art. He carried on from his teacher Lin Fengmian. After graduation, he moved to Taiwan to teach at the provincial Chiayi High School. In 1957, he held his first solo exhibition. In 1962, together with Liao Chi-chun, he accepted an invitation of the U.S. State Department to visit the United States. Afterward, he went to France to study in Paris for three years. After his return to Taiwan, he taught at the Tamkang University architecture department and National Taiwan Normal University. In 1975, he won the Chungshan Literary Prize Award. Shiy De-jinn was known for the lyrical mood of his watercolors, at the same time being influenced by Pop Art and Op Art. His favorite subject matter was old-style traditional Taiwan architecture. He traveled all over the villages and counties of Taiwan seeking inspiration. His works richly display Taiwan's folk, scenes and customs.

LEE Chung-Chung 李重重

Born in 1942, Anhui, China



Lee Chung Chung (1942-) is an essential master in modern Taiwanese ink painting. Born in China and immigrating to Taiwan in 1945, she studied alongside master Liu Guo-Song, the father of modern ink art in Taiwan and founder of the Fifth Moon Group. As a female pioneer in the male-dominated world of abstract ink artists, she has only recently been recognized as a top Taiwanese artist. In 2024 she will have an important retrospective exhibition at the National Taiwan Museum of Fine Arts.

Lee has described her painting style as an elephant stomping its feet, producing big explosions of water and vivid colors. She uses a technique called 'paper-turning,' which revolves around the paper to gain a new perspective before continuing. Her abstract subjects are the scenery, figures, and feelings pulled from her love of traveling worldwide. She uses an automatistic method, not consciously controlling the brush but letting the art flow naturally from her. She sometimes puts objects under the paper to create textured layers like rubbings. Now 80 years old, she is still painting today as an exclusive artist to Liang Gallery and has consistently been the best-selling artist for the gallery at Art Basel Hong Kong.

YU Peng 于彭

1955-2014, Taipei, Taiwan



Yu Peng was born in 1955, and passed away in Taipei in 2014. Compared to the people that suffered from separation and displacement back in the earlier era, whom Pai Hsien-Yung depicted in his novel, *Taipei People*, Yu grew up in the comparatively more stable post-war era.

Yu's lifelong art career could be divided into the following three stages: the early-stage from 1980 to 1997; the middle-stage from 1998 to 2004, and the late-stage from 2004 to 2014. Yu created mostly drawings and watercolor works in the early-stage, and be-sides stylistic influences from Chen Yi-Keng, Yu was also inspired by both Taiwanese and overseas artists that he had read about in magazines such as *The Lion Art Monthly* and *Artist*. During the middle-stage, he was invited by Cheng Tsai-Tung in 1997 to stay in Shanghai for three years. In addition to first-hand experience of the glamorous Shanghai, Yu also traveled through different parts of China, which inspired the depth and diverse features seen in his ink landscapes and paintings of people. Landscapes of Desire: Figure Series is an iconic series from this stage in Yu's career. He frequently traveled between China and Taiwan to partake in many art projects and exhibitions.

Yu was well known for his ink paintings; however, his earlier sketches and pastel drawings also offer great insights on his masterful ink creations, as these earlier works reveal how he had successfully transformed the lines and strokes from Western drawings into the exciting ink expressions created later in his career. Yu's oil paintings, prints, calligraphies, and hand-painted ceramic artworks are also innovative and highly unique.

HSU Yunghsu 徐永旭

Born in 1955, Kaohsiung, Taiwan



HSU uses clay as the primary material in creation. The production is complicated and highly laborious, and at the same time, it faces challenges from the environment, climate, and firing. Hsu's sculptures are formed of strips of clay, textured by his own body movements and fingerprints. He regards his art as a kind of performance, a struggle against both time and his own physical limitations. To watch him work is to see his arthritic hands bound with supportive wrappings, repeating the same movement over and over as he builds those same strips piece by piece into something greater.

The artist transfers his energy, time, and effort through his body into artworks to create the flow of energy within the sculptures. Hsu is fascinated by the idea of the biological instinct of returning to the nest, as well as the passage that the Greek God Helios drives his chariot across the sky relentlessly from dawn to dusk, which echoes his repetitive process of creating. Above all, it is about the transformation of his physical body into the higher form of his art. As Hsu said, one day, his body would wear out, so he must use it as much as he can.



Yuma TARU 尤瑪・達陸

Born in 1963, Miaoli, Taiwan



Yuma TARU, a Taiwanese aborigines Atayal artist, graduated from the MA, Textiles and Clothing, Fu Jen Catholic University, New Taipei, Taiwan in 1998. In 2016, she was given the title by the Ministry of Culture as one of the preservers of important heritage of traditional arts and cultures in Taiwan. Through solid research, investigation and analysis, she reconstructed the depth and breadth of traditional Atayal weaving. Based on this foundation, Yuma has gradually moved forward towards creation of modern art, and in recent years, Yuma tried to take the expectations of daughters who have inherited the culture, and transform them into textures that are possessing heart-to-heart exchanges on the weaving loom. The chitter-chatter of the loom speaks of the cultural innovation for Atayal weaved products and the future of the tribal youths. Her art is based on traditional indigenous cultures, starting from her research of traditional Atayal textiles with a focus on the characteristics of threads made of traditional and contemporary materials.

She spent 30 years conducting field trips to over 100 Atayal villages. She also went to museums abroad to study traditional indigenous attires, trying to revive already lost handicraft techniques and memories. She attempts to continue and pass down the indigenous tradition by systematically categorizing her research findings; promoting the growing of fiber plants used for indigenous textile production; reviving the art of traditional indigenous textiles; and studying and reproducing the textiles in museums. She is dedicated to combining education of indigenous peoples and contemporary fiber art, planting the seeds of future hopes for the indigenous dyeing and weaving art in Taiwan.

Born in 1966, Taoyuan, Taiwan




Hsu Hui-Chih began a career in editing at one of Taiwan's leading newspapers, Liberty Times and later became the editor-in-chief of Unitas Magazine. He was also the director of the board of the National Culture and Arts Foundation. He currently serves as the president of Route Culture Co. Ltd.

Hsu's artwork is literature-oriented based and the development of Chinese calligraphy art. It is an integration of the poet's sensibility and rationality and a personal reflection from transcribing Buddhist sutras. In Hsu's creation, there is a manifestation of literary pictures, which demonstrates individual emotions and contemporary consciousness significantly. He uses ink primarily and experiments with different kinds of media, such as acrylic and mineral pigments, to enrich the artistic pictures and concepts.

Recently, Hsu actively participated in solo exhibitions and international art fairs, including Art Basel Hong Kong, Taipei Dangdai, and Art Taipei. He was invited to exhibit at 「By the People: Creative Chinese Characters」 in Hong Kong Museum of Art from 2022 to 2023.

HSU Chia-Wei



Born in 1983, Taichung, Taiwan



Chia-Wei Hsu graduated from Le Fresnoy- Studio national des arts contemporains, France in 2016. He is an artist, filmmaker, and curator whose work merges the language of contemporary art and film unearthing the complex production mechanisms that are behind the process of image-creation. Through his practice, Hsu weaves together connections between humans, materials, and places that have been overlooked or omitted from conventional historical narratives.

He has participated in exhibitions at Eye Filmmuseum, Amsterdam, Netherlands (2019), Biennial at Shanghai, Gwangju, Busan and Sydney (2018), 2 or 3 Tigers at Haus der Kulturen der Welt, Berlin, Germany (2017), 2016 TAIPEI BIENNIAL - *Gestures and Archives of the Present, Genealogies of the Future* at Taipei Fine Arts Museum, Taipei, Taiwan (2016), HUGO BOSS ASIA ART at Rockbund Art Museum, Shanghai, China (2013), The 55th International Art Exhibition - la Biennale di Venezia: *This is not a Taiwan Pavilion* at Palazzo Ducale, Venice, Italy (2013), and *Faux Amis / An Ephemeral Video Library* at JEU DE PAUME, Paris, France (2010).

He and a group of artists also run an art space in Taipei: Open-Contemporary Art Centre, an organisation with functions of curation, creation, narrative, inter-disciplinary exchange, education as well as the promotion of art that strives to seek every possibility to create communication in contemporary art. He is also the curator of *Taiwan International Video Art Exhibition* at Hong-Gah Museum, Taipei, Taiwan (2018), *THAITAI: A Measure of Understanding* at Bangkok Art and Culture Centre, Bangkok, Thailand (2012), and co-curate the 2019 Asian Art Biennial at National Taiwan Museum of Fine Arts (2019) with Ho Tzu-Nyen.



Chou received his MFA degree in painting from the Taipei National University of the Arts in 2012. In the same year, his paintings were selected for the Made in Taiwan – Art Taipei Young Artist Discovery in 2012. His solo exhibition, *State of Flux*, was held at Taipei Fine Arts Museum in 2016.


From Chou's earlier series of works since 2011, such as *Globe Silent*, *Beyond the Silence*, and *Beyond the Mountains* to more recent series, Chou Tai-Chun has been gradually constructing a unique visual experience and imagination manifesting his generation. Developing from two-dimensional paintings to painting installations, he continues exploring issues relating to the conflict between human interventions and nature. Chou borrows a wide range of Taiwan's industrial history and terrain changes to his time theme to examine the cultural changes during the century.


